Ceremony rentals are 4 hours and include 1 hour for the rehearsal. You may add additional hours for a reception. Each additional hour is \$200 per hour. Food and beverage is not included. If you would like to flip the chapel and have the reception upstairs, there is a \$500 dance floor rental and flip fee. A 20% cleaning/staffing/set-up fee will be added to the rental fee.
